Reading tips

For young readers

When reading a text, it's important to remember these top tips:

- Does it make sense?

Read the text back. Do you understand all of the words? Does it sound write when you read it aloud?

- Word choice

Look at how a character is speaking, is it 'said', 'whispered', or 'bellowed'? Think about how you need to change your reading voice to show this.

- Punctuation

Think about how punctuation is used. How will you change your reading for questions, exclamations or action in a text.

Adults, you can share these tips with your children to make their reading more fluent and engaging.

The big help will be when you read and reread too.

6 Ps of fluent reading

Using these skills, you can make reading aloud a fun and engaging experience for any listener. When reading to a child, remember the 6 Ps.

- Pitch

Is the pitch of your reading high or low? Does your tone change for different characters or scenes?

- Punctuation

Read ahead and look at the punctuation you recognize. How has the writer used them and how that changes how you should read.

- Pause

Think about how long the pauses need to be in your reading. Think about why the pauses have been included.

Passion

Can you use emotion in your voice? Are your audience excited by the reading? Include lots of expression to keep the interest high!

- Power

Is your voice loud enough? Do you need to emphasis words or make your voice quieter for effect?

- Pace

How fast do you speak? When do you need to speed up or slow down?
